A Note From YOUR VICAR



I can't have you all around to look at my holiday photos so you'll have to listen to a story instead!

We visited France where I quickly discovered that my GCSE French is in dire need of a replenishment from Duolingo. I would start a sentence and then quickly discover that the lovely Francophone was speaking much better English than I could speak French. In England, speaking multiple languages is a sign of sophistication and education whilst elsewhere it is simply normal for everyone from the security services, icecream sellers (my main conversation partner admittedly) to local gentry speaking multiple languages without even thinking about it. I feel I'm missing out somewhere here. Wittgenstein once wrote "The limits of my language mean the limits of my world" meaning that if you expand your linguistic abilities your world gets bigger (he meant more than that but not for now!).

Travel always extend the corners of your tent a little and it is always the small things that I normally enjoy about visiting other countries. I like seeing the different ways they run supermarkets – what's normal and sold in bulk (goats cheese?!), the way roads run (excellent) or even rubbish is collected (short answer...it's not!) tells you something about a different people.

But this time was different because the thing that struck me the most was Mont St Michel. Go and see it. It is amazing – truly amazing. A grand total population of 30 people, it is a massive monastery/ abbey built on an island stretching into the sea and mud flats. It is now rather filled with touristy shops but this did not detract from the sheer wonder of the place, the sheer soaring ambition of a people with much less money, power and tools than we have now building something extraordinary to the glory of God.

A Bishop said he had a vision of the Archangel Michael telling him to build a church on an island in the sea. So he did. And it grew and grew into a stupendous building soaring to the heavens and crowned with a great image from Revelation with the angel defeating the dragon. The church became castle-like in appearance and was never conquered despite two besieging attempts (by the English in the Hundred Years war. I thought I knew what this place was but I had missed out and if this is unfamiliar look it up.

I came away astonished at the sheer vaulting ambition of the place. Of what is really possible when people get together and commit to do something awesome. The world is a confusing place at the moment with lots of different things that seem like they're about to be torn up and destroyed. Us humans are really good at blowing stuff up and destroying but we're also really really good at building things. Proverbs phrased it; Wisdom builds the house, but folly tears it down with their own hands". When you're evaluating people's perspective and words, ask not just what they are against but what are they trying to build?

BISHOPS LETTER

BISHOP MICHAEL BEASLEY BISHOP OF BATH AND WELLS



In August I was privileged to dedicate the restored clock in the tower of Montacute church. It's not just any old clock. In fact, Montacute's is amongst the oldest in the country. Built in the village in around 1400, the clock is so old that it is held in place by iron wedges. At the time of its construction, the nut and the bolt wouldn't be invented for another hundred years! The Montacute clock is an artefact that seems to generate generosity. In the 1980s the clock was restored by Humphrey Hamlin, for whom it is <u>now named. Humphrey</u> poured time and energy into its mechanism, preventing it from being scrapped. During the last two years, heroic efforts by the people of Montacute have led to its further restoration. All this was marked last month by a whole village gathering. The community choir sang, morris men danced, the local pub provided a hog roast, cake was dispended in huge quantities.

Montacute is a beautiful example of how generosity begets generosity. Like a chain reaction, one act of generosity, the restoration of the clock, led to another, another and another. As a result, a whole community was brought together in celebration and joy.

In his second letter to the Church in Corinth, Paul writes of the church in Macedonia that 'their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity' (2 Cor 8:2). Having nothing, the Macedonians discovered that they could still give. In turn, their generosity enabled Paul to challenge and encourage the church in Corinth to do the same. All to help the struggling Church in Jerusalem.

As I travel around our diocese, I see this pattern of generosity begetting generosity happening in so many places. One person starts, another adds their contribution, more join in and soon we learn that together we are so much more than the sum of our parts. This is the economy of God. It's an economy that all of us are invited to join.

PRAYER MINISTRY TRAINING COURSE STARTING SOON

This short two session course is offered to encourage All Christians to have confidence in

Praying for each other, not just for healing but for any issue that may arise in our lives.

It is based on Biblical principles and examples, with Jesus as our role model both in what He did, but also what He taught.

For example in Jesus' final instructions to his disciples before His Ascension we read in Mk 16.15 on

"Go into all the world and preach the good news to all – In my name you will place your hands on sick people and they will get well". Prayer Ministry is for all people, Christians and non Christians alike.

Jesus also tells us, His followers that He gives us power and authority to minister to others, to cure diseases, and to heal the sick (in mind, body or spirit) Luke 9.1-2. Throughout the Gospels we find accounts of Jesus healing all kinds of disease, paralysis, seizures, severe pain, even those affected by demons.

Until Jesus returns He has passed this ministry of prayer on to us . In John 14.12, Jesus clearly states "I tell you the truth, anyone who has faith in me will do what I have been doing."


There it is, Jesus wants us to be exercising Prayer Ministry in His name today.

Taunton Open Door


Open Door in Taunton is a support centre for those who are rough sleeping In the first instance we provide a warm welcome, a smile and a cuppa. After that we work to ensure people have their basic needs met. We have showers, a clothing store and provide a laundry facility. We also serve breakfast and lunch with unlimited refills of tea, coffee and juice. This all works to increase people's self-esteem and gives them a positive sense of belonging to our community.

We then offer tailored support plans for individuals which target key goals such as developing life skills, sustaining accommodation and accessing employment. All of this is underpinned by a staff team of three and a huge team of over 30 volunteers. Without our volunteers, and support from donors, we would not be able to make such a difference in people's lives.
