A Note From

YOUR VICAR

This last week I've been watching Thomas the Tank Engine. Or actually re-watching now that I have a toddler again. As a child, Thomas was a total obsession of mine with the adventures of Henry, Gordon and James seared onto my cerebrum. Originally written by the Rev. W. Awdry they seemed to have been written as a way of teaching moral lessons about character through story. I had to hunt for the old versions (thank you, Youtube) because the modern ones have retained the brand but changed everything with the opening credits accompanied with squealing guitars, literal tank engines jumping off the rails and a world tour. Somehow I felt all wrong in my stomach and I had to switch off.

Rewatching the old episodes is like a timewarp in so many ways. The animation is comparatively basic with static models, moving along fixed tracks and only the eves of the engines giving expression to the story. Camera angles are fixed in one position. If you watch 5 minutes of contemporary kids programs they try to fit as many different perspective points in as possible and 'shots' will jump every few moments.

Lastly, the big difference is the tone. The engines clearly need to learn. One example has stuck; 'Henry' the green engine refuses to travel in the rain lest he damage his paint. As a punishment, he is bricked into the tunnel with his eyes able to see his other engines going past....he is only able to come out when he is needed and apologizes. If any of you have watched Peppa Pig or

Bluey, then this is quite different where the emphasis is on the child and the fulfilment of their wishes. Peppa regularly calls her father fat and silly, whilst Bluey's parents will embarrass themselves no end. in order to make the children happy.

Is one or the other better? I've wondered about this very article sounding like a whingy call to nostalgia or 'better in my day' when really what I'm wondering about is the way that we tell stories. Old Thomas the Tank used to use both positive and negative examples whereas modern kids TV tends to avoid negative examples at all. It's not that we should return to a negative and punishing era but if we lose a way to tell stories about things, then we lose the way to talk about things too.

When we read through the scriptures, Jesus uses parables with positive examples (the lost sheep) but also negative examples too (unmerciful servant). This makes him a master communicator to get his point across because he can use the whole spectrum of life to speak. Life is full of good and bad things; positive and negative experiences. The person who can only ever speak in gloomy mode is similar to those who can never switch off their fixed grin; it's not real. This is why I love the bible because all of human life is shown and explored (especially the Psalms). It's real.

Firstly, as a Deacon, secondly, as a Priest, thirdly as a Bishop. Obviously not everyone becomes a Bishop and not everyone becomes a Priest, but if you make it to Bishop then you'll already be a priest and deacon! The different terms are ancient and derived from the 'Threefold Order of Ministry' that has its roots in the scriptures. Deacons are focused more on the community and engaging outside of the church, can baptise and marry people; Priests are more focused on the care of the church itself and are also authorised to lead communion. Bishops can confirm, ordain people and have enormous headwear which helps their 'oversight responsibilities'.

Where it all gets a bit confusing is that in the CofE, you are ordained to roles but then have different jobs. A good example is here at St George's, Nick is ordained Priest but his job is as the Vicar of Wilton, whilst Richard is a Priest but works as a Chaplain, whilst Rob is currently a deacon but his job is as an 'Assistant Curate'. Different terms are thrown around for leaders including 'Father', 'Pastor', 'Padre' and much ruder terms but that's another story. I hope this simplified version helps you figure out what all these different terms mean!

"Take the A38 towards Wellington and. at Chelston roundabout (interchange for junction 26 for M5) take 2nd left to continue along the A38 around Wellington.. At the Penhill roundabout take the 1st left to continue along the A38 (towards Exeter). Pass the Beam Bridge Hotel on your left.

When you see the sign "Dual carriageway" ahead ", indicate and move into right hand lane and turn right - signposted to ' Westleigh, Appley, Holcombe Rogus and Greenham 'also a 'Westleigh Quarry 'sign. Continue for approximately half a mile then turn left - signposted 'Westleigh and Holcombe Rogus and Westleigh Quarry Continue for approximately another half a mile, following the road around to the left with another 'Westleigh Quarry' sign.

Watch out for potholes from here - drive slowly! In about a mile, on a bend, turn right into 'Beech Car Park ' - brown tourist sign ' Grand Western Canal '







FAITH, HOPE & MENTAL HEALTH (22:37)

Those of you in church on Sunday would have heard Nick mentioning a new event, which we hope will be the first of a few of them looking at mental health and faith.

We have Kintsugi HOPE coming to join us for the day - a charity based in the UK striving to make a difference to peoples mental wellbeing.

Patrick Regan, one of the founders ,said: "Following a series of life-changing events including loss, illness and lots of surgery, life became increasingly overwhelming. This had a major impact on my emotional and mental health. My 'man up' self talk didn't work, and I ended up suffering with anxiety and depression. I felt broken and filled with shame. However, when I opened up to share my brokenness, I found I wasn't alone."

"I learnt that being honest about my struggles not only helped me, but also helped open the door for many others to be honest too. It is so much easier facing difficult situations with others than on our own." "I then discovered Kintsugi – the Japanese art of mending broken pots with golden glue. The gold makes a feature of the cracks instead of hiding them. All of us have broken pieces, but instead of hiding them, we can learn from them. We can discover treasure in our scars."

General election 2024: Invitation to pray for the nation

The bishops of the Church of England have issued a call to put prayer and participation at the heart of the General Election campaign as the UK prepares to go to the polls.

Archbishops Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell are asking people to set aside time amid the heat of the coming campaign to reflect and pray for our nation and our world. The Church of England is launching a campaign known as #PrayYourPart – to promote prayer and participation in the life of our nation and communities, both as voters and as citizens.

A series of daily thematic reflections written by bishops, drawn from the Bible, and exploring major themes will be published shortly, covering the final three weeks up to polling day. They will be available as a booklet, in audio form for smart speakers, as free opt-in emails, and through social media.

Bishop Michael and other senior church leaders in the County of Somerset have urged all candidates and political parties to, "conduct their campaigns with integrity, honesty and fairness and to seek the common good, with a spirit of listening."

As senior church leaders in the County of Somerset, we celebrate the life, beauty and variety of this vibrant County.
Our churches are actively involved in the life of Somerset's villages, towns and cities through our church communities and buildings, chaplaincies, schools, food banks, and community networks.

With a General Election having been called for 4 July, we acknowledge the enormous challenges we share in our County, and the deep responsibilities that any elected politician will face:

• The deep financial crisis currently

experienced by Somerset Council

- · The lack of affordable housing
- The reality of poverty for many families and the high cost of living
- The pressures on our farming community and the rural economy
- The changes in our climate that affect our flood levels and weather
- The increasing pressures on our NHS and Social Care provisions
- The needs of refugees including our guests from Ukraine

We call on our churches and church members to:

- encourage people to register as Voters (by 18 June deadline)
- engage actively in the election by asking challenging questions of all candidates
- take part in hustings meetings with local candidates, and make use of churches to host such meetings
- · remind people to take personal ID to the polling station
- · encourage people to vote
- pray for all those who seek to serve as our political leaders

We urge all candidates and political parties to:

- conduct their campaigns with integrity, honesty and fairness, avoiding smears and personal attacks
- seek the common good, with a spirit of listening

Loving God, now that an election has been called, hear our prayers for our country and the campaign ahead.
